QUESTION 3

The following points form the answer to the question. Accept ANY SEVEN points. The points need not be in any specific order.

NOTE: The quotations in the first column are intended to remind markers of what the direct quotations are.

QUOTATIONS	POINTS
1. 'Coffee, unless caffeine ..., increases one's energy levels.'	1. Coffee contains caffeine which increases energy levels.
2. 'Too much sugar ... affects one's sleeping patterns and appetite.'	2. Too much sugar in food affects sleeping patterns.
3 'Another important point...routine every night.'	3. Not following the same bedtime routine every night makes one restless.
4. 'One should also ... going to bed.'	4. Exercising a few hours before going to bed makes one restless.
5. 'This means that one should not allow noise in one's bedroom.'	5. Noise in the bedroom disturbs one's sleep.
6.'Digestion also affects the quality of one's sleep.'	6. Food should be properly digested.
7. 'Finally, the most ... to bed angry.'	7. Going to bed angry causes sleeplessness.

MARKING:

Award marks as follows:

- 7 marks for 7 points
- 3 marks for language

Penalties:

- If the candidate has not presented the summary in the required format, the candidate should be penalised by deducting 1 mark from the total mark awarded.
- Language errors (grammar, spelling, punctuation): deduct the 2 marks for language as follows:
 - 0 – 5 errors – no penalty
 - 6 – 10 errors – subtract 1 mark
 - 11 – 15 – subtract 2 marks
 - 16 errors or more – subtract 3 marks.
- For direct quotations of **whole sentences**, penalise as follows from the total mark awarded for the points and language usage:
- 1 – 3 whole sentences quoted: no penalty
 - 4 – 5 whole sentences quoted: deduct 1 mark
 - 6 – 7 whole sentences quoted: deduct 2 marks
 - Subtract 1 mark from the total marks awarded for the points and language usage for not indicating the word count, or for an incorrect word count.

NOTE: Abbreviations should not be used but should they appear in the summary, they must be counted as the number of words that they represent.
