#### THE PRACTICAL ASSESSMENT TASK FOR CONSUMER STUDIES PRODUCTION OF KNITTED AND CROCHETED ITEMS

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

The 16 Curriculum and Assessment Policy Statement subjects which contain a practical component all include a practical assessment task (PAT). These subjects are:

- AGRICULTURE: Agricultural Management Practices, Agricultural Technology
- ARTS: Dance Studies, Design, Dramatic Arts, Music, Visual Arts
- SCIENCES: Computer Applications Technology, Information Technology
- SERVICES: Consumer Studies, Hospitality Studies, Tourism
- TECHNOLOGY: Civil Technology, Electrical Technology, Mechanical Technology and Engineering Graphics and Design

A practical assessment task (PAT) mark is a compulsory component of the final promotion mark for all candidates offering subjects that have a practical component and counts 25% (100 marks) of the end-of-year examination mark. The PAT is implemented across the first three terms of the school year. This is broken down into different phases or a series of smaller activities that make up the PAT. The PAT allows for learners to be assessed on a regular basis during the school year and it also allows for the assessment of skills that cannot be assessed in a written format, e.g. test or examination. It is therefore important that schools ensure that all learners complete the practical assessment tasks within the stipulated period to ensure that learners are resulted at the end of the school year. The planning and execution of the PAT differs from subject to subject.

- During the practical assessment task the learner must demonstrate his/her knowledge and practical ability/skills to produce knitted and crocheted articles focusing on suitability for selling.
- The practical assessment task for Consumer Studies for Grade 12 consists of two practical examinations of eight hours each.
  - **Term 2: Practical examination 1** Learners will crochet/knit the article selected for the micro-enterprise used for the project in term 1.
  - **Term 3: Practical examination 2** Learners will knit/crochet the article.

#### 2. MARK ALLOCATION

• Each exam consists of 100 marks. The mark for the final practical assessment task is obtained by combining the marks for the two exams as indicated below:

Practical examination: term 2	100
Practical examination: term 3	100
Total	200 ÷ 2

- The marks for the PAT are part of the end-of-the-year assessment.
- The province will provide two separate computerised mark sheets, one for SBA and one for the PAT. After the marks have been captured both mark sheets must be signed by the teacher, principal and moderator.

#### 3. **REQUIREMENTS FOR THE PRACTICAL EXAMINATIONS**

Consumer Studies is a choice subject with five practical options. If the school chooses to offer Consumer Studies as a subject and selects the knitting and crocheting practical option, the equipment and funds necessary to conduct the PAT, as well as the specified number of practical lessons is the responsibility of the school as specified in the CAPS document.

Ensure the following:

- A suitable classroom with the necessary equipment must be available: tables; two or more ironing boards and irons; scissors (one for each learner); equipment for measuring and marking and equipment for knitting and crocheting.
- A minimum of R30 to a maximum of R75 per learner for EACH of the two practical examinations is required, besides the funding required for the SBA practical lessons, to make the required articles.
- A number of learners can do the examination simultaneously according to the number of work stations and resources available to complete the examination comfortably.
- Divide the learners into groups with a maximum of 12 learners. Twenty-four learners (two groups of 12 learners) can perform the examination on the same day, e.g. from 08:00 to 12:00 and from 12:00 to 16:00.
- The teacher will need time between the two sessions to prepare the classroom for the following group.
- Schools with large numbers of learners will need more than one day to complete this examination.

#### 4. **REQUIRED TIMEFRAME**

- A timeframe of 8 HOURS in total is required per examination.
- Each examination will be conducted in TWO sessions of FOUR hours each, with a minimum 30-minute break after two hours OR a school may decide to spread the eight hours over TWO DAYS OF FOUR HOURS PER DAY with a 30-minute break after two hours.

#### 5. SETTING THE EXAMINATIONS

#### 5.1 Practical examination 1 (term 2): Crochet PAT

- This practical examination **must be slotted into the examination timetable in the second term**.
- Learners will crochet the article that has been selected for their micro-enterprise (project in term 1). The production process, workmanship and saleability of the products form an important aspect of the examination.
- The teacher must identify and select ONE suitable article for the micro-enterprise (project term 1). The learners will make this article during practical examination 1 and practical examination 2.
- The teacher must buy a commercial pattern for an article that can be completed in 16 hours with the skills learners gained during the practical lessons for SBA in Grades 10 and 11.

- Teachers have TWO options when selecting the pattern for practical examination 1:
  - $\circ~$  Buy a commercial pattern for an article that can be completed in 8 hours; **OR**
  - Use the same commercial pattern used in the practical lessons and remake the same article once more in 8 hours.
- The selected articles should carry a total weighting of 100 points on the skills-code list.
- The techniques to be completed per examination should have a total weighting of 50 points for each PAT task.
- Learners should start and complete the article in practical examination 1.
- The selected article must be made in eight hours, demonstrating all the advanced techniques identified for Grade 12.
- After eight hours learners should hand in their articles for final assessment. After the assessment has been completed the articles are returned to learners for correction and finishing off if necessary. The articles will NOT be remarked after the corrections have been done.

#### 5.2 **Practical examination 2 (term 3)**

- This examination will take place on a date agreed upon with the moderator.
- The learners will be assessed on the production process, workmanship and the saleability of the articles.
- A timeframe of 8 hours in total is required per examination.
- The selected article must have a total weighting of 100 points according to the skills-code list.
- The techniques to be completed per examination should have a total weighting of 50 points for each PAT task.
- After eight hours learners should hand in their articles for final assessment. After the assessment has been completed the articles are returned to learners for correction and finishing off if necessary. The articles will NOT be remarked after the corrections have been done.

#### TECHNIQUES THAT MUST BE INCLUDED:

Knitting Techniques (PAT 2)
Select ONE of the following patterns:
Cable pattern
Lace pattern
<ul> <li>Any raised/textured pattern</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>The following techniques are COMPULSORY:</li> <li>Casting on</li> <li>Casting off</li> <li>Ribbing stitch</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Garter stitch</li> <li>Stocking stitch</li> <li>Using different colours of wool</li> <li>Edge stitch to finish off the article</li> <li>Making up the completed article</li> </ul>

#### 6. **PREPARING FOR THE EXAMINATION**

#### The teacher is responsible for the following:

- Set the dates for both examinations. Communicate these dates to the SMT of the school to ensure that these dates do not clash with other school activities.
- Copy the illustration(s) and instruction sheet for each learner or buy a pattern for each learner. It is compulsory for each learner to work from an instruction sheet.
- Prepare the mark sheets provided with learners' names and their examination numbers.
- Learners must receive the instructions **one week (7 school days)** before the date of the examination of the first group of learners so that they can prepare.
- Purchase all required items.
- Make up a 'kit' for each learner to include the following:
  - **PAT 1:** Crochet equipment, pattern, instruction sheet, wool(s) and yarn(s), crochet hooks
  - **PAT 2:** Knitting and crochet equipment, instruction sheet, yarn(s) and wool(s), knitting needles and crochet hooks
- Divide learners into groups according to the number of learners that can easily be accommodated in the room. The number per group will depend on the available resources.
- Prepare the classroom for the examination and ensure the availability of small equipment, e.g. scissors.

#### 7. PERFORMING THE EXAMINATION

#### 7.1 Practical examination 1 in term 2: 8 hours (crocheting)

- This examination will be conducted in TWO SESSIONS OF FOUR HOURS EACH, with a 30-minute break after two hours OR ONE SESSION OF EIGHT HOURS with a 30-minute break after two hours.
- Hand out each learner's 'kit' with crochet equipment, wool, yarn, patterns, stitch holders, row counters and instructions.
- The teacher must invigilate and assess the learners while they are performing the practical examination and he/she may NOT do any other work or assist the learners in any way.
- The teacher must mark practical examination 1 and capture the marks. Then the learners may correct mistakes, make improvements and complete the article. The article will NOT be remarked after the corrections have been made.
- After the corrections have been made the articles are to be kept in a safe space until the day of practical examination 2 in term 3.

- 7.2 Practical examination 2 in term 3: 8 hours (knitting and crocheting)
  - This examination will be conducted in TWO SESSIONS OF FOUR HOURS, with a 30-minute break after two hours **OR** ONE SESSION OF EIGHT HOURS with a 30-minute break after two hours.
  - When learners enter the classroom, hand them their 'kits' with knitting and crochet equipment wool, yarn, patterns and instructions.
  - Enough wool/yarn and scissors should be available.
  - Individual learners, under the supervision of the teacher, carry out practical examination 2.
  - The articles should be ready for assessment after 8 hours. Learners will lose **2 marks for every 5 minutes late** up to a maximum of 20 marks.
  - The teacher must invigilate and assess the learners while they are performing the practical examination and he/she may NOT do any other work or assist the learners in any way.
  - The teacher must mark practical examination 2 and capture the marks. Then the learners can correct mistakes, make improvements and complete the article. The article will NOT be remarked after corrections have been made.

# 8. EVALUATION

- The teacher and external moderator have 30 minutes to evaluate the final products, inspect the learners' work stations and complete the mark sheets.
- The learners should tidy their work stations on completion of the examination so that the teacher/moderator may inspect it for the final allocation of marks.

# 9. MODERATION OF THE PRACTICAL EXAMINATION

# 9.1 BEFORE practical examination 1

The subject advisor must receive and moderate the following by the end of term 1 or earlier to ensure the examination is of an appropriate standard:

- A photocopy of the pattern
- An illustration of article
- The list of wool/yarn, haberdashery, etc. to be purchased
- The estimated cost per learner
- The completed checklist, checked and signed by the principal
- An instruction page for the learners with the assessment criteria and mark allocation for both practical examination sessions
- The mark sheets for each practical examination
- Planning for practical examination 1 and practical examination 2 sessions, indicating the total weighting of techniques

# The PAT cannot be done unless it was approved by the subject advisor.

# 9.2 ON THE DAY of practical examination 2

- During term 3 the last group of learners will be externally moderated by the relevant subject advisor while performing the practical examination at the school.
- The teacher must have the following available for the moderator on the day of moderation:
  - All the articles that learners made during the practical classes for SBA (if not moderated during SBA moderation)
  - All the PAT 1 articles of all the learners for verification, if they are making another article
  - The completed articles of all the learners who have already completed both examinations
  - All the articles of the learners who have already completed the examination must be marked and the mark sheets must be available
  - A separate set of assessment tools for the moderator to use, with the names and examination numbers of the learners already on the mark sheet
- The moderator will randomly select six candidates and independently assess the learners while they are performing the examination.
- Afterwards the moderator will compare his/her assessment with that of the teacher. If the moderator finds that the marks of the teacher differ more than 10% from his/her marks, a block adjustment upwards or downwards should be made based on the difference.
- The computerised mark sheet must be completed on the day of moderation.

• The table below demonstrates how to determine the difference between the moderator's marks and teacher's marks to determine if adjustment is needed and the margin of adjustment required:

- A block adjustment can also be made based on the professional judgement of the moderator, if the practical exam of the school is not of the expected standard.
- The moderator will discuss the outcome and any adjustments with the teacher. The final moderated marks should then be entered on the computerised mark sheet.
- The marks of all learners will be affected if an adjustment is made.
- The marks of all the learners need to be finalised and signed by the subject advisor and principal on the day of this examination. The computerised mark sheet must be completed on the day of moderation.

# SKILL-CODE WEIGHTING FOR TECHNIQUES USED IN KNITTING

- Use the following skill-code weighting to choose a pattern for the PAT as well as for the weekly practical lessons.
- The skills code indicates the weighting for the techniques and NOT the mark allocation.
- The weighting for a specific technique should only be allocated ONCE.
- The teacher could add a technique not listed below after discussing it with the subject advisor. The teacher and subject advisor should then decide on the weighting for the new technique.

#### **REQUIREMENTS:**

1 x 50 g ball Pingouin double knitting wool One set of 4 No. 8 double-pointed knitting needles

#### ABBREVIATIONS:

Sts = stitches; P = purl; K = knit; psso = pass slip stitch over; tog = together; dec = decrease

#### PATTERN:

Using set of 4 No. 8 knitting needles, cast on 30 sts on each of 2 needles and 32 sts on third needle, giving on a total of 92 sts.  $1^{st}$  round: P  $2^{nd}$  round: K Repeat these two rounds 4 times more. Next round: \*K1, P2, K1, repeat from \* to end. Continue in rounds of K2, P2 rib until work measures 15 cm from cast on edge.  $1^{st}$  dec round: \*K1, sl 1, P1, psso, K1, repeat from \* to end. Keeping rib correct as now set work 2 rounds without dec.  $2^{nd}$  dec round: \*K1, sl 1, K1, psso, repeat from \* to end.  $3^{rd}$  dec round: \*K2 tog, repeat from \* to end.  $4^{th}$  dec round: \*K2 tog, repeat from \* to end. Break off yarn/wool and thread through remaining sts. Draw up and finish.

# **CROCHET FLOWER**



#### **REQUIREMENTS:**

# ABBREVIATIONS:

Ch = chain; ss = slip stitch; dc = double crochet; tr = treble; dtr = double treble

# PATTERN:

With yellow yarn work 4 ch.

Join into a circle by working a ss into first ch.

1<sup>st</sup> round: 1 ch, work 15dc into circle. Ss to 1<sup>st</sup> ch.

 $2^{nd}$  round: Join 1<sup>st</sup> contrast into top of last stitch with a ss, 3ch, \*miss 1dc, 1tr into next dc, 1ch, rep from \* 6 times more. Join with a ss into 2<sup>nd</sup> of 3ch

*3<sup>rd</sup> round:* 1ch, into ch space work 1tr, 1dtr, 1tr, 1dtr, 1dc to form a petal, \* into next ch space work 1dc, 1tr, 1dtr, 1tr, 1dc, rep from \* until 8petals have been worked. Join to first petal with a ss

 $4^{th}$  round: Join 2<sup>nd</sup> contrast with a ss between dc of last and first petal to begin 2<sup>nd</sup> row of petals, 4ch, \* 1dc between dc at start of next petal, 3ch, rep from \* to end. Join with a ss into 1<sup>st</sup> of 4ch.

 $5^{th}$  round: 1ch, into first 3ch space work 1tr, 2dtr, 1tr, 1dc, \* into next 3ch space work 1dc, 1tr, 2dtr, 1tr, 1dc, rep from \* until 8 petals have been worked. Join to first petal with a ss.  $6^{th}$  round: Join 1st contrast with a ss between dc of last and first petal of  $2^{nd}$  row of petals, 5ch, \* 1dc between dc at start of next petal, 4ch, rep from \* to end of round. Join with a ss into first ch.

*7<sup>th</sup> round:* 1ch, into first 4ch space work 1tr, 3dtr, 1tr, 1dc, \* into next ch space work 1dc, 1tr, 3dtr, 1tr, 1dc, rep from \* until 8 petals have been worked. Join to first petal with a ss. Finish off and sew onto knitted cap.
