PROVINCIAL ENGAGEMENT IN THE MPUMALANGA PROVINCE



The Basic Education Director-General, Mr Hubert Mathanzima Mweli concluded the first phase of his engagement with provinces in the Mpumalanga province on 18 April and 20 April 2018.

In addressing the meeting of education officials (provincial officials, district directors, circuit managers, subject advisors and school principals), in Middleburg on 18 April and Nelspruit on 20 April Mr Mweli drew their attention to the five social justice principles of access, redress, equity, efficiency and quality by which the performance of the system may be assessed. Although every province has unique strategies and plans initiated to support schools, there are common challenges facing the education sector in all nine provinces. The issues that were raised in most of the meetings included, training of teachers in language teaching, the improvement of effective teaching in Accounting as one the critical commercial subjects, the promotion of participation and through put rate in Mathematics and Physical Sciences and the improvement of effective functionality of technical schools in the country.

Mr Hilton Visagie, the Manager for Administration, Certification and Data Processing said that effective learning and teaching need to be emphasised in the Foundation and Intermediate Phases."School principals should play an integral role in ensuring that teachers apply the right techniques of teaching reading in the General Education and Training (GET) band. Language teachers should be upskilled to become more language competent," said Mr Visagie. Ms Modipa, Chief Education Specialist for Policy in Curriculum, said teachers must employ the educational imperative aimed at developing learners who can think critically and creatively, use evidence to support their solutions in complex problems, and communicate clearly. "The Implementation of formative assessment is a strong mechanism to determine effective learning outcomes," said Ms Modipa, adding that, "quality of School Based Assessments (SBA) in GET should be improved to prepare learners for Further Education and Training (FET). Therefore, provinces must empower teachers in the implementation of SBA to ensure that effective learning and teaching prevail. "Absence of formative assessment results in accumulated content deficits due to shortage of immediate remediation," remarked Ms Modipa.

In his address, Mr Mweli told the education officials that much progress has been made in terms of improving quality education in public schools. However, Mr Mweli mentioned that more effort should be placed on improving quality and efficiency for learners, such that they leave the schooling system with the requisite skills such as problem solving, analytical and critical thinking. "The results from the 2017 National Senior Certificate Examinations confirm that the System is on the rise," remarked Mr Mweli, adding that, "a total of 803 431 candidates enrolled to write the 2017 NSC Examinations. 401 435 candidates attained the NSC, an increase of 2.6% from 2016. The percentage of learners achieving admission to bachelor studies increased from 26.6% in 2016 to 28.7% in 2017. In terms of redress, 243 260 candidates from no-fee schools obtained the NSC compared to 138 525 from fee-paying schools. 76 300 candidates who achieved the admission to bachelor studies come from no-fee paying schools compared to 67 867 from fee paying schools," explained the Director-General.

With regard to equity, 296 201 girls wrote the NSC Examinations as compared to 238 283 boys. 84 516 girls also attained admission to Bachelor studies compared to 69 094 boys. 62.6% of the distinctions were attained by girl learners, including distinctions in critical subjects such as Accounting, Business Studies, Economics, Mathematics and Physical Science," added Mr Mweli.

Mr Mweli further emphasised that the sector must invest more resources in the improving quality and efficiency in public schools. He then called upon school principals to use data to analyse learning gaps in various subject streams and provide schools with adequate support to achieve quality learning outcomes. "The sector can do better if all the education stakeholders could come together to improve quality learning and teaching in the Foundation and Intermediate Phases," said Mr Mweli. The Director-General further informed those in attendance that the sector should come up with collective approaches in dealing with deficits that are impacting negatively on effective functioning of schools.

Mr Jan Mkwanazi, the Acting Deputy Director-General for Curriculum, said the Director-General's meeting was very helpful because it enlightened key education officials on the direction the sector is taking. "These meetings encouraged us to pay more attention to challenging learning areas including gateway subjects such as Mathematics, Physical Science and Accounting. With the information shared during these meetings, we are confident that our schools will improve for the better this year," said Mr Mkwanazi.
