This incident was incredibly disappointing and extremely frustrating to say the least. However thanks to swift action by education officials and the police we have seen an important arrest made of a suspect who is facing serious criminal charges as a result.

Marking is currently under way in all the provinces and I look forward to announcing the results on the 4th of January 2017. As has become normal our colleagues in exams don't get a break during this period and an extra thank you goes to these dedicated officials.

International Assessments

Colleagues, it is very encouraging to see our progressive and continuous improvement in International Assessments. The improvement seen in TIMSS 2015 is testament to the hard work and dedication of all in the sector and I am appreciative of all the efforts and interventions that have informed these improvements. It is exciting to know that we can, slowly but surely turn the education system around.

I would like to wish you all good luck for what is left of the year and hope you have a relaxing holiday period. We all need to come back refreshed in the New Year ready to tackle the new challenges we find in 2017.

The community protests in Vuwani, Limpopo have been by far one of the most challenging and often left us feeling slightly hopeless because there was very little we could do as the education sector to intervene.

The protests in the Northern suburbs of PE also kept us busy, however in that situation the Department was at least able to intervene to try and resolve some of the challenges that emerged, and assist the province to move forward.

The Minister has taught me that with every crisis comes an opportunity, and this gave us the opportunity to show case the brilliant work we have done in terms of infrastructure delivery in the past three years. From ASIDI's one school a week handovers of state of the art schools, to rolling out sanitation and coming up with innovative water solutions for schools. We have been able to showcase the progress that has been made under difficult circumstances.

All of these we could not have dealt with efficiently as communications if it wasn't for the support and assistance from every single official. Without the rest of the Department providing us with the relevant information we would not have been able to do our job from an informed perspective.

There have also been some exciting highlights; the National Teachers Awards have become an event that many look forward to. World AIDS Day is commemorated at Thaba Nchu in the Free State Province

World AIDS Day was observed globally on 01 December 2016. Albert Moroka High School at Thaba Nchu in the Free State Province, hosted the 2016 DBE World AIDS Day (WAD) commemoration on 02 December 2016. The lively event was held at the Barolong Cultural Village and was attended by officials from the Free State Provincial Education Department, School Governing Body (SGB) members, principals, learners and educators from six primary and three secondary schools. The DBE theme for WAD 2016 is "It is in our hands to end HIV and TB; It is in our hands to Triumph", a rallying call for all our learners, teachers, parents, caregivers, officials and the community to play an active role in ending HIV and TB by 2030, as directed by the National Development Plan (NDP). South Africa is a proactive country that has tackled HIV head-on through a strong partnership between Government, civil society, business and labour.

As a build-up towards the commemoration, Grade 8 to 11 learners from 14 schools in the Motheo District were engaged in competitions to demonstrate their understanding of the drive to end HIV and TB. Grade 10 to 11 learners were asked to provide and to substantiate their views on the provision of comprehensive sexuality education, as well as sexual and reproductive health services in schools. Their input will be analysed and used to inform the implementation of DBE programmes. The competition required learners to respond through the making of a quilt or the design of a postcard. The Province adjudicated all entries and the top schools received awards in the two categories. In addition, all the participating schools received certificates of acknowledgement from the DBE, as well as a medal from the Province.

The keynote address by Ms Bukelwa Qwelane, Director of Inclusive Education in the Province, emphasised the need for the Department and for schools to work with the Departments of Health and social partners to provide sexual reproductive health services to learners. Ms Qwelane called on the School-based Support Teams to create an enabling environment that is learner-friendly, to provide the required support.

A dialogue with learners on the topic of condom distribution in schools was facilitated by peer educators. Learners of all ages participated enthusiastically, expressing varied opinions. Learners also rendered various forms of entertainment, such as poetry, traditional dancing and musical items in line with the theme of taking responsibility and not succumbing to peer pressure.

Boitumelong Special School was the first place winner in the quilt category - receiving a laptop for their efforts. The second place winner of an iPad was Refentse Primary School, and Tshipinare Primary School, who finished in third position, received a Smart Phone.

In her closing remarks, the Circuit Manager reminded the learners about their engagement during the build-up activities, and said that 02 December 2016 should mark a turning point for each individual, and for the community of Thaba Nchu in eliminating HIV and TB.







DBE and the Department of Sport and Recreation South Africa to host 5th National School Sport Championships

The Department of Sport and Recreation South Africa, in partnership with the DBE, will host the School Sport Championships, referred to as the summer games, at the University of the Witwatersrand in Johannesburg from 10 to 15 December 2016.

Being hosted on a national level, the tournament targets more than ten thousand learners from across all nine provinces. Apart from being utilised as a mechanism for promoting social cohesion, the summer games also provide learners with an opportunity to showcase their sporting talents whilst encouraging them to lead a healthy lifestyle. During this tournament all learners, including boys and girls, will participate in sixteen priority codes and nine indigenous games. The *National Sport and Recreation Plan* was approved by Cabinet during April 2012. The first South African National School Sport Championships was subsequently hosted during December 2012 and 2016 will see the 5th National School Sport Championships bringing together school learners across South Africa to compete in the games.

The 2016 Championships model change was brought about after the Director-General of Sport and Recreation South Africa, Mr Alec Moemi, established a Task Team to carefully consider the National Championships model and recommendations were made for the Championships to take place during three seasons: the autumn, the winter and the summer games from 2016 onward.








IRC Book Review




Dealing with HIV and AIDS in the Classroom
