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



Oosgrensaafrikaans


Originally spoken by the cattle farmers in the interior


One thing – one word! → compound words

Are learners provided with enough knowledge and skills to read and identify words correctly



Setting benchmarks for Early Grade Reading (Afrikaans)

- 1 Understand that languages differ inherently
- 2 Acknowledge the linguistic features of the language
- Step 3** Develop the tests
- Step 4** Pilot assess the feasibility/acceptability
- Step 5** Test



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
