Assessed learners in Grades 4 and 7



Comprehension Question Difficulty

- A shared understanding of comprehension difficulty is important for benchmarks
- Questions differ in difficulty by type AND within each type
- We classified the questions using the PIRLS taxonomy into four comprehension processes:
- 1. Retrieving explicitly stated information;
- 2. Making straightforward inferences;
- 3. Interpreting and integrating ideas and information; and
- 4. Evaluating and examining content, language and textual elements

In benchmarks setting practices adopted were:


- Adapted EGRA practice from 1 minute for ORF to 3 minutes
- Learners only asked questions related to the parts of the passage they read

Percent correct on each comprehension question for learners attempting all questions




- 479 for grade 4 passage1

- 743 for grade 7 passage 2






Accuracy and Speed

Percent accurate compared to words per minute










Accuracy and Speed

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
Number of words attempted trimmed to the 1st and 99th percentile, * = second passage

- Typically 95% accuracy speed for the end of grade 2 benchmark.
- In the Afrikaans sample, only 19% of learners are reading 70 correct words per minute or faster at the beginning of grade 4
- This fluency point is not contextually appropriate for the end of grade 2 for Afrikaans
- 90% accuracy was more appropriate for the benchmark

Grade 1 Afrikaans Benchmark



End of Grade 1

All learners should know their LETTER SOUNDS well, sounding at least 40 correct letters per minute

Why Letters?


- Letters are a good early **predictor** of oral reading fluency (ORF) later in Foundation Phase.
- The same benchmark has been adopted across all the languages
- Improvements in letter-sound speed stagnate at 40 letters.

End of Grade 2

All learners should be able to read at least 50 correct WORDS per minute when reading a passage

Why 50 words per minute in a passage for Grade2?

- Below this threshold, accuracy is poor and we find little evidence that learners can comprehend what they have read.
- This is therefore a minimum benchmark, if learners do not reach this level of fluency, higher-order reading skills are very unlikely to develop.
- In this sample, 34 percent of learners had reached this benchmark at the end of grade 3





Grade 3 Afrikaans Benchmark



End of Grade 3

All learners should be able to read at least 80 correct WORDS per minute when reading a passage


Why 80 words in a passage for Grade 3?

- At this level of fluency reading comprehension becomes increasingly possible when learners read on their own.
- Once learners reach this level of fluency, it appears that poor comprehension skills become the limiting factor to further literacy development.
- At the beginning of 2022, only 15 percent of learners in this sample had reached this benchmark at the end of grade 3.
- However, 69 percent of learners in the same schools had reached the benchmark at the end of grade 6.
